SOUTH HADLEY - The South Hadley Recreation Department has crafted a busy summer of concerts and camps, plus a circus and big rig day, for all of the town's residents, children and adults alike.

Unlike some towns that offer a wide range of activities and programs for youth, South Hadley does have many opportunities for adults in the community.

"I feel like that gets overlooked sometimes as the majority of our programs are for kids," said Danielle Bachand, assistant recreation director.

For adults who want to improve their tennis game, or learn how to play, the town is offering

weekly tennis lessons throughout the summer. Those will follow the weekly tennis lessons for children, with those broken up by age.

Concerts on the Commons will begin June 27 and run through August 29. The season kicks off with the South Hadley Community Band, then has appearances from Cottonwood, The Willies and Blue Devil Blues - just to name a few.

Friday Cruise Nights have returned to Buttery Brook Park and will run through Sept. 6. The free event offers a chance to see vintage cars, enjoy some food made by local "celebrity" chefs and - new this year - enjoy a free concert from local musical favorites like Johnny & the Flashbacks and Union Jack.

Of course, the whole family can come out to the town's fireworks on July 3 at the Michael E. Smith Middle School. The rain date will be July 5. In addition to an impressive fireworks display to end the evening, the event generally features a wide range of activities for kids, like a bounce house and face painting, as well as food booths and other vendors. Final details are still being worked out at this time.

#### **Tigers Marching One Hundred reminisce**

SOUITH HADLEY – In its prime, the South Hadley Marching One Hundred would spend a week each August at Camp Becket preparing their half-time formations for football season, learning the complexities of bandwork, like marching and concert music, as well as intangibles such as teamwork, work ethic, and camaraderie.

Over fifty years later, Dan Pease, Studio Manager at South Hadley Community TV 15 filmed former directors and band members as they reminisced at various locations throughout the camp.

These places include Gibson Hall where the band rehearsed their music, the football field where they practiced their half-time formations for footballs games, and the Dining Commons where they enjoyed meals together.

According to former band member and producer of the documentary, Elizabeth Moynihan Ballard, "A documentary on the South Hadley Tiger Marching Hundred would not be complete without filming at 'Band Camp."

Frank Fuller, who in the 70's acted as Associate Band Director, spoke about how this location had been chosen.

#### Resident commissioned as Second Lieutenant in U.S. Air Force

SOUTH HADLEY — On Sunday, May 19, Benjamin Chevrette was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Air Force after five years in the ROTC, Detachment 370, UMass Amherst, with a degree in Civil Engineering.

Chevrette will serve as a Civil Engineering Officer, with the location as yet to be determined.

Because he had to give up his seat as a pilot, Chevrette needed another job, as he could not be commissioned without one.

There were four candidates for commissioning, but Chevrette was the only one presented by Lieutenant Colonel Lucas Hall, the Commander himself, as a leader who has already faced adversity and disappointment but has taken it in stride.

Chevrette was to have received flight training in Pensacola after receiving his Commission, when it was discovered that he had red-green vision deficiency. Because of this, Chevrette will never be a pilot.

After considering other career paths, Chevrette received a pleasant surprise when the Air Force gave him the job of Civil Engineer.

During his four-year commitment to the USAF, he will not only be able to determine whether he wants to stay in the military, but will also have a firm

basis to decide whether to continue in an engineering career.

At the ceremony, comments were made by both the Mas-

ter of Ceremonies and Lieutenant Colonel Hall, as well as Chevrette's own address to those gathered. The commander joked about Chevrette letting him win in trivia, and when his father went onstage to pin him with his Lieutenant's Bar, he followed up by saying that he never let Chevrette win any game or sport - "and now look at him!"

"I already miss him," said his father, M.P. Chevrette. "I hope I didn't embarrass him by singing the National Anthem; although two people complimented me on my 'performance' -- one thought it was part of the program -- I would have sung stronger had I known I'd be doing a solo."

Chevrette and his father, along with the cadets and officers, joined in singing the "Air Force Song" at the close of the program.

Chevrette had to have a job to be commissioned, but doesn't know where he will be stationed.

Instead of the AFSC number, the assignments of all the cadets were given their common names so that those in attendance would have a better idea of what they'd be doing. However, the Air Force was not able to assign Ben to a location to be posted on such short notice.

The Air Force Specialty Code is an alphanumeric code used by the United States Air Force to identify a specific job. Officer AFSCs consist of four characters, and a letter prefix or suffix may be used with an AFSC when more specific identification of position requirements and individual qualifications is necessary.



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#### June question for the Garden Lady

Aline, who gardens is Springfield wrote in with this question for the Garden Lady: "In my yard I have several trees with a grey/white substance. A plant expert at Sixteen Acres Garden Center diagnosed it as lichen. He said there was nothing I could do to treat it. This substance is covering my trees. Could lime on the soil help? My soil is acidic. I also have Japanese maple trees. I do not want lichen to attack them. There has to be a solution. Thank you for your assis-

This was one of my more interesting ques-

Lichen is a living organism that is part fungus, part algae. It grows on many different things, from rocks, to trees, even the ground and other surfaces like gravestones and metal fences.

As far as your trees go, it isn't hurting them. Because it grows on the surface of the bark, it doesn't affect the vascular system of the tree. In other words, it doesn't rob the tree of vital nutrients or moisture because it cannot penetrate that part of the plant; it is only on the surface.

Lichen simply needs sunlight, moisture from the air and a place to attach! Kind of amazing, if you think of it.

I realize you don't like it though, so what can

One expert recommended spraying a soapy solution (made with a mild detergent) on the lichen and rubbing it off with a soft brush. I would be extra careful if I did that, especially on young trees or trees that have soft bark.

As you may have gathered, liming the soil will not help.

Melissa wrote in with this question: "Lilacs are among my favorite bushes! I really wish they had a longer bloom time than they do - doesn't everyone!? I didn't have as many flowers as I should have this year. I think my shrub needs to be pruned. Can you please advise? I remember hearing that you shouldn't do it too late in the summer, and how much is too much? I have some old stems that are a good 5-6 inches in diameter. I think they need to go but I wanted to hear what you had to say. Thank you!"

Here are the basics of lilac pruning, starting with deadheading. As soon as possible after the flowers have gone by it's important to remove spent blossoms down to the first leaf.

By doing this you will stop seed formation, energy will be conserved and redirected to next season's flower production. Since buds are set in summer you should tackle any necessary stem or branch pruning soon after flowering.

If pruning takes place in fall, winter, or in spring prior to bloom there is a good chance you will cut off next year's flowers!

How do you know if pruning is necessary?

One reason to prune would be because your flowers are out of reach- the bushes have simply gotten too tall. Another reason, and it usually joins the first, would be that the main stems have gotten woody and unsightly - this sounds like your concern.

Consider rejuvenating the plant.

Start in the center of the bush at ground level and work out, cutting out the oldest stems. Then concentrate on reducing the overall height to 6-8

Severely overgrown lilacs can be handled in this manner over a three year period, pruning out 1/3 each year. You will see flower production increase dramatically if you follow these directions.

#### Social Security's earnings test and Cost of Living Adjustments

**Dear Rusty:** 

Is there a limit on earnings when you're fully retired? Also, should all retirees receive Cost of Living Adjustments or is there an exception?

Signed: Retired But Wondering

#### **Dear Retired:**

Your questions are fairly simple but, nevertheless, often perplexing to those wishing to apply for Social Security, because the SS rules are many over 2,700 of them and those about to apply for their benefits may be simply unsure and want to avoid a costly mistake. I'm happy to answer your questions and, hopefully, clarify any uncertainties you have on these topics.

Social Security imposes an earnings limit on anyone who collects Social Security before reaching their Full retirement Age. If you haven't yet reached your FRA somewhere between 66 and 67, depending on the year you were born and you continue to work, there is a limit to how much you can earn before they take away some of your


So, the answer to your first question is, yes, there is an earnings limit \$22,320 for 2024 if you haven't yet reached your Full Retirement Age. If the annual earnings limit is exceeded, Social Security will take away some of your benefits (\$1 for every \$2 you are over the limit, up to the year you attain FRA when the assessment is less). However, if you have already reached your Full Retirement Age the earnings limit no longer applies and you can earn as much as you like without consequence. And here's a nuance to be aware of: if you work and exceed the earnings limit and have some benefits withheld as a result, when you reach your FRA, you will get time credit for any months you didn't get benefits, which will result in your monthly amount being a bit higher after your FRA.

Regarding Cost of Living Adjustment, everyone, without exception, who has earned a Social Security benefit and reached eligibility age (62) receives the annual COLA increase whether they are already collecting their benefits or not. If you're not yet collecting, the COLA is added to your "primary insurance amount" or "PIA" on which your benefit will be based when you claim.

If you are already collecting SS, COLA will be added to your gross monthly SS benefit amount. However, since there was a \$9.80 increase in the 2024 Medicare Part B premium, and since the Part B premium is taken from everyone's SS benefit payment, Social Security recipients enrolled in Medicare Part B will not see the full 3.2% COLA in their net monthly Social Security payment. Everyone will receive the COLA increase, but no one enrolled in Medicare Part B will get the full COLA increase in their net SS payment because some of the COLA increase is used to pay their increased Medicare premium.

received an email from a Brimfield couple, who spotted a male and female rose-breasted grosbeak a their feeder. They also had an indigo bunting and reported their hummingbirds were back.

The female rose-breasted grosbeak like many female bird species lacks the brilliant colors of the male. The female has a white eyebrow, brown in color with heavy streaking and two white wing bars. She shows yellow "armpits" in flight.

The male has a black head and back with a red triangle on its white breast. In flight it shows white patches and rose-red "armpits." Grosbeaks are eight inches long. Their song is a rapid series of whistles often called a "robin in a hurry." Their call is a distinct squeak like a "sneaker on a gym floor."

"During my first year in South Hadley, I was looking for a summer job and applied for a position at Camp Becket YMCA camp. I interviewed at the camp in the spring and toured the facility...I agreed to a staff position for the summer."


Fuller shared that Band Director Roger Farnsworth, who held the position from 1965-1980, "expressed frustration" with the "spotty attendance" at band camp, which up till this point had been held in the High School, every day during the week leading up to the first day of school.

"I knew Camp Becket was large enough to handle our group. We needed a football sized drill field, an indoor concert hall, a dining facility to feed 150 students, staff and chaperones and girls and boys cabins, it was all there. Roger immediately agreed and set about making it happen by contacting the camp and reserving a week in August."

Concerning the 'spirit' of the camp, what Fuller recalls more than anything, "is how hard everyone worked."

"Roger put together a demanding schedule of early calisthenics, morning afternoon and evening marching rehearsals and concert rehearsals. He expected a freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior band member at every table during meals to encourage teamwork."

"The week flew by and the progress we made in those seven

days was amazing."

Steve Boisvert, a former member of the band, shared similar sentiments, and shared that, "Being a part of the Tiger Marching Hundred was not easy."

He continued, saying that, "At times it was hard work, but what thing that has value comes easy? We worked hard, we played hard, we laughed, we cried, we toiled, we triumphed, we came in individually, we

came together collectively, and we each were better because of our experiences."

Both Boisvert and Ballard shared how their experiences of being on the band have since impacted their entire lives.

According to Ballard, "I honestly can say that I do not believe there is any part of my life that has not been informed / impacted positively by my experiences of being a part of this band. I learned leadership in many ways

by Dr. Farnsworth and Mr. Fuller's leadership.

I saw two men that saw things in their students that many of those students did not see in themselves and then they encouraged them to see it and work to attain it. In my professional life I use that example in leading others. I learned to envision big things, things that do not seem possible, and then develop a plan to make those visions come to be and bring

together others that could also see the vision and work together with them to bring others along for the adventure..."

She closed her reflection by stating that, "Some of my success in every job, every endeavor that I have undertaken after High School was born in part from the lessons learned by being a part of the band," adding, "No, this is not hyperbole."

Boisvert shared similar sentiments, and is of the opinion that despite all the national attention and success the band was able to accomplish, this fanfare "pales" in comparison to the very real and positive impact the Marching One Hundred had on hundreds of lives.

"This legacy stands in my life and after our visit and the reminiscences of the group that took the time to walk the paths of our past time at Camp Becket, I came to realize this was also true in the lives of all of us there."

Some lessons learned were compiled by the group, such as , "Success does not come on the day of the performance, it comes on the first day and each day of practicing," and, "You win by helping others to be better."

The group shared that the best part was enjoying the day with former band director, Dr. Roger Farnsworth and former associate band director, Frank Fuller.

According to Ballard, "We all still feel the love and camaraderie we once had more than 50 years later."

The female lays three to six pale blue eggs with irregular brown spots in a nest of coarse and fine twigs lined with horse-hair, rootlets and grasses placed in the branch of a tree 5 to 25 feet above the ground.

#### Belchertown birds

A Belchertown resident sent this email, "We saw our first Northern oriole this year on Thursday, May 9. He was scolding my husband as he changed the bird bath water. We usually have a pair nesting in the shagbark hickory in front of our house. Hopefully, they will do so again this year."

She also said she had not seen any chickadees and usually has many in her yard. She wonders why. She also has redwings, goldfinches, house finches, mockingbirds, cat birds, robins, bluebirds, swallows and house wrens.

#### Birds at Warren ponds

A Brimfield resident often reports on the birds he sees. He visited a pond on South Street in Warren on May 9 and saw an osprey and six great blue heron. There were two new nests at the pond making a total of four nest there. Other birds were a red-tailed hawk, turkey vulture, two mourning doves, one crow, three three swallows, one barn swallow, six common grackles and six red-winged blackbirds.

On the same day, he visited a pond on New Reed Street in Warren and saw two spotted sandpipers, two

double-crested cormorants, two turkey vultures, three Eastern kingbirds, five tree swallows, four red-winged blackbirds, six common grackles and on yellow warbler.

He said, "This week in the yard we have 4 catbirds, and a pair has started a nest iin the quince bush near the house. I've see two female ruby-throated hummingbirds and one male. A male was seen April 29t a little earlier that usual."

#### More birds

The same Brimfield resident saw two female Baltimore orioles and one male at the orange and jelly feeder. A common yellowthroat and an American redstart, both males, were in the yard recently as was a house wren. The wrens have nested in nesting boxes the last several years. He

also said a Cooper's hawk has been patrolling the area the past week or so, but hasn't seen any piles of feather.

#### **Another visit to Warren ponds**


At the South Street pond in Warren, he said, "The ospreys are continuing to tend their nest

and there are now four for sure, maybe five great blue heron nests. One of the heron nests has three chicks as of a few days ago."

On New Reed Street in Warren, there were two double-crested cormorants for about a week until yesterday and I saw a blue-headed vireo there.





#### Girls tennis falls to Belchertown in WMass semifinals

BELCHERTOWN—Five of the seven starters on the Belchertown girls' tennis team are members of the senior class. Winning a Western Mass. title is one of the few things that they haven't accomplished during their high school tennis careers.

The top-seeded Lady Orioles advanced into the Western Mass. Class B finals for the second consecutive year and for the third time in the last four years after dispatching the fourth-seeded South Hadley Lady Tigers, 5-0, in the semifinals held at Belchertown High School on May 22.

"This is going to be our third time playing in the Western Mass. finals during the past four years," said Belchertown head coach Alanna Grady. "We lost to Longmeadow in the finals during the COVID season. We lost a heartbreaker to Ludlow in last year's finals. We've had a core group of players during the past several years. It's very special for them to be going back to the finals again."

The Lady Orioles (17-3), who captured the Valley Wheel league title with an undefeated record, haven't won a Western Mass. title since 2016. They were slated to face either second-seeded St. Mary's of Westfield or third-seeded Pittsfield in this year's finals. They haven't faced either of those teams in recent years.

While the Lady Orioles' main objective was to bring home the championship trophy for the first time in eight years, the Lady Tigers (7-10) were satisfied just qualifying for the Western Mass. tournament for the first time in a couple of years.

"Just making this year's Western Mass. tournament is a very big thing for us," said first-year South Hadley head coach Kelly Gearin. "The girls have been working very hard and they're dedicated. We're also a young team and I'm really hoping everyone comes back next year. Our season isn't over yet because we'll be playing in the


A year ago, Seacoast walked into Lusitano Stadium and celebrated a 2-1 victory. It was the Pioneers' only home loss during the 2023 regular season.
