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## **Cultural Council moves** forward with 2024 grants

SOUTH HADLEY - It's the busy season for the town's Cultural Council as they process and assess dozens of grant applications for local artists, musicians, and performers.

At its most recent meeting on Nov. 27, the council finalized the list of those who will and won't receive funds for its 2024 grant cycle and assigned liaisons to those whose projects were funded for next year.

Among the roughly five dozen applicants, 16 were denied funding for various reasons. Mostly, the council denied funding for two main reasons, including that some of the programs or events would not have a significant enough impact on the South Hadley community. These were mostly events that would take place outside of the town of South Hadley. The other main reason was that the application didn't meet local council standards. Some didn't have specific venues chosen or didn't have letters of support. Others asked for more than 50 percent funding of the project or were proposed by people who had previous projects funded but had yet to use those funds. Some others had programs that had already happened or were scheduled to happen outside of the

2024 calendar year, which was a requirement of the local council.

"We try to be clean with our funding requests," said John Anz, chair of the South Hadley Cultural Council.

The information about which projects will not be funded will first go to the Massachusetts Cultural Council, which will then generate letters to those people or groups. Anyone who had an application denied then has 15 days to respond and possibly provide more information. The local council may then re-assess and either confirm the denial or decide to fund the project.

Letters for those projects that have had their funding approved will be notified by Jan. 17. They will receive notification from the Massachusetts Cultural Council and then from the South Hadley Cultural Council. The information from the South Hadley Cultural Council will include important paperwork and information for which member is the project's liaison and how to proceed.

The projects currently approved for the 2024 grant year include presentations about history, tourism, and aging, workshops for dance, a wide range of concerts and theater presentations, as well as many

### Public Hazard Mitigation Plan update set for December 14

SOUTH HADLEY - Residents, businesses, and surrounding community members are invited to learn about and provide input on the town's Hazard Mitigation Plan at 6 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 14, at the South Hadley Public Library, 2 Canal St.

The Public Forum will include an overview of the hazard mitigation plan, the risks from natural hazards and climate change impacts in South Hadley, and previous mitigation actions, according to a press release. Food will be provided, and there will be giveaways of South Hadley T-shirts and bicycle helmets.

"The Forum is an opportunity for you to share your opinions and participate in the mitigation planning process," a press statement reads. "Municipal officials and PVPC staff will be available to answer questions about the project. All members of the public, representatives from surrounding communities, and other interested parties are encouraged to attend. Public participation and input are essential."

The purpose of the Hazard Mitigation Plan is to assess South Hadley's vulnerabilities from natural hazard and climate change risks and to identify actions to reduce the risks.

"A mitigation action is any action that reduces or eliminates the risk to human life and property from natural hazards," the press statement said.

The plan is being updated by the town with assistance from the Pioneer Valley Planning Commission (PVPC) and is funded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA).

Upon completion, the plan will be submitted to MEMA and FEMA for review and approval. A FEMA-approved plan makes the community eligible for federal and state mitigation grant funding.

## We're planning to claim at 62; what do we need to know?

### **Dear Rusty:**

My wife (born May 1962) and I (born April 1963) are retired and will soon be looking to start collecting our Social Security as we each hit 62. As this is new to us, I'm wondering what things we may need to be aware of or consider as we get closer to her 62nd birthday in May. Any advice or information will be appreciated. *Signed: Planning Ahead* 

### **Dear Planning:**

If you and your wife are both retired from working and have decided to start your (reduced) Social Security as soon as you are eligible at age 62, then there is nothing you need to do in advance of applying. The Social Security retirement benefit amount for each of you will be determined by your individual lifetime earnings record and your age when you claim. If either of you will be eligible for a spousal boost from the other, that will be automatically applied when both of you are collecting.

If your wife plans to claim her Social Security as soon as she is eligible, she should apply for her benefits about three months in advance and choose the option on the application which states "I want benefits beginning with the earliest possible month and will accept an age-related reduction."

For information, an applicant must be 62 for an entire month to get benefits, so your wife's first month of eligibility will be June 2024. Social Security deals only in whole months and pays benefits in the month following the month earned; so if your wife's birthday is between the 11th and 20th of the month her first Social Security payment will be received in her bank account on the third Wednesday of July. All subsequent payments will be on that same schedule.

Then, when it's time for you to claim, you should follow the same process as your wife and, if either of you is entitled to a higher amount as a spouse, it will be automatically applied when your benefits later start.

Applying for benefits is a relatively simple process if done online at www.ssa.gov/apply. Note that to apply online your wife will need to first create her personal "my Social Security" account, which is easy to do at www.ssa.gov/ myaccount.

To prepare for applying later, you can also create your personal online account now (it's required to apply online), at which you will see what your estimated benefit will be at different ages. Of course, your wife first (and later you) can also call Social Security at 1-800-7721213 to request an appointment to apply for SS retirement benefits in person. Applications which are not done online are usually taken over the phone vs. requiring a visit to your local Social Security office, but applying online is, by far, the most efficient method; you can link to the application process from your online account. One important thing to be aware of: By claiming at age 62, the monthly payment for each of you will be 70% of what it would be at your Full Retirement Age and that is a permanent reduction. If you expect at least average longevity about 84 for you and 87 for your wife and if it is financially feasible, then waiting longer to claim would yield a higher monthly amount as well as the most in cumulative lifetime benefits. For those with an FRA of 67, SS retirement benefits claimed at FRA are 30% higher than at 62 and, if claimed at 70 are 75% more than at 62. And, although the decision on when to claim is always personal, a married couple should also evaluate their joint needs when deciding. One final word of caution: although you and your wife are now retired from working, be aware that if you claim SS benefits before your FRA and return to work, Social Security has an earnings test which limits how much you can





# Seventy-five years and going strong

was opening the curtains in my bedroom this morning to find that my Babci's Christmas cactus had burst into bloom!

How exciting for an indoor plant to live for seven plus decades, never mind that the last two have been under my care. It's no secret that I am not an indoor plant aficionado, but I do have my favorites, and this is one of them.

Read on to learn about this beloved plant, straight from the archives.

One horticulture related Christmas memory involves my mother's Christmas cactus. I remember the arching, woody stemmed plant on an iron stand in her bedroom; before that it lived in my Babci's house.

Every year, just in time for the holiday, it would flower, putting on quite a show, beautiful and exotic in hot fuchsia-pink.

Today, only five original branches remain. But if you look closely within the base of the plant, you'll see lots of new growth.

Perhaps if I follow the advice, I have outlined below this heirloom will be blooming in the home of my future grandchildren! in the same pot for several years its soil is likely exhausted of nutrients.

Repot by gently teasing away some of the soil from the plant's roots. Replace it with the new soil mixture. Choose a pot that is a single size bigger than the existing root ball, or reuse the old pot.

Many people hear "cactus" and think that the plant is drought tolerant. With the Christmas cactus this is only partly true.

Although its leaves are succulent and can retain a fair amount of water, it is not a true cactus. As a general rule you should water Christmas cactus when the potting soil is dry to the touch.

Adequate moisture is especially necessary during the spring when it begins its growth and once buds are set. A diluted amount of liquid fertilizer can be added then as well, especially if the soil hasn't been refreshed in many years.

When the plant is done flowering, it will go into a period of rest; almost no water is necessary for nearly two months. Just prior to bud set it will rest again but this time the soil shouldn't dry out completely.

Two environmental factors are responsible for coaxing a plant into bloom. The first is temperature and the second is light.

If temperatures at night range between 55 and 60 degrees for a six week period, the plant will set buds regardless of day length. If temperatures run higher than that, thirteen hours of uninterrupted darkness will bring about buds.

Simply put the plant to bed each night from 6 p.m.-8a.m. until buds form. My luck has been temperature related; because I leave the plants outside until early fall its temperature requirements are met and I am delighted with blooms come Christmas time. If your plant sets buds and then drops them prior to full bloom it is likely due to overwatering or exposure. For this reason, keep it away from drafty windows, doorways or radiators. If you don't already own Christmas cactus, consider purchasing one this holiday. Better yet, start a plant. Simply get a leaf - no longer than two or three segments, from a friend. They are easy to root in regular potting soil.

The Christmas cactus (Schlumbergera bridgesii) is an epiphyte, native to South America where it happily grows hanging from trees in the jungle. Inside, it prefers a location with indirect light. Positioning it in front of a north or east facing window is best.

During the summer months many people prefer to move the plant outdoors. I have had good luck placing it under the shade of a tree; too much sun will burn its leaves.

When night temperatures begin to dip into the forties it is time to bring the Christmas cactus indoors. Gradually acclimatize the plant to its winter home by increasing the number of hours spent inside each day.

It is very important that the Christmas cactus be planted in a well-drained growing medium. For this reason, either coarse sand or perlite should be added to any homemade potting soil.

A recipe that combines equal parts of either of these along with garden loam and leaf mold or compost should work out just fine. Christmas cactus like to be somewhat pot bound, but if the plant has been growing Two or three of these per four-inch pot is perfect. By year two you should be delighted with some beautiful flowers and maybe the start of your own family tradition.

# Bike/Walk Comm. to offer free bike lights this weekend

SOUTH HADLEY- On Saturday, Dec. 9, volunteers from the town's Bike/ Walk Committee will be distributing free bike lights to South Hadley area cyclists as part of MassBike's Lights Brigade program.

Free sets of lights will be available near the Log Cabin at Buttery Brook Park from 5:30-7 p.m. during Santa's Land, or until the supply runs out, according to a press statement.

"Stay safe. Stay legal. Use lights at night," the Bike/Walk Committee released. "Having front and rear lights on your bike is crucial. Without working lights, you are practically invisible to vehicles. All bike riders in Massachusetts are legally required to have front white lights, red rear lights, and rear and side reflectors when riding anytime from 30 minutes after sunset until 30 minutes before sunrise."

MassBike's Lights Brigade program supplies volunteers with free bike lights to distribute to cyclists in their community.

"Many riders find themselves out at night without the required lights to help them stay visible to drivers and others on the roads and paths, while being in

## STM asks voters to decide on \$5.3 million restoration project

GRANBY – In order to get its municipal offices under one roof, the town of Granby is requesting voters to approve a \$5.3 million restoration project of the former West Street School building at a Special Town Meeting next week.

The Special Town Meeting will be held on Monday, Dec. 11, at 7 p.m. in the East Meadow School gym. The vote on funding the West Street building project is the only item on the warrant.

One of the reasons for the project is due to the fact that the town is renting the Town Hall Annex building for \$25,000 annually and has 18 months to determine what to do with the offices within the building since the property owner is seeking to sell it.

Granby Town Administrator Chris Martin explained the funding sources for the project in a STM information session held last week.

The town proposes to use \$1.8 million in ARPA funds, \$1.4 million in unspent prior general fund articles, and \$2.3 million in unspent capital project articles.

The cost of the project includes installation and/or repairs of a sprinkler/fire protection system, windows and doors, the HVAC system, a water system, and PCB and asbestos removal. The funding also covers Owners Project Manager's fees, designer/engineer fees and contingency, according to the future of the West Street building document on the town's website.

The West Street building committee, appointed in January of this year, was assigned the task of determining the best course of action for the use of the building, which has been largely vacant since 2018. The town currently maintains the building for \$23,000 a year.

The committee determined the best use of the property was to renovate it.

Committee Chair Lynn Mercier explained the building would be able to accommodate current municipal offices, the senior center, as well as room for more in the future.

"As the structure of the building was sound, the roof was relatively new, and the existing 44,000 square feet of space would be more than adequate for the town's needs," she said. "The space as it exists, is capable of conducting town meetings, town elections and has the potential for a community recreational center in the future."

One of the major priorities of the project for the town is the removal of a single-wall oil tank, which was supposed to be removed, but wasn't, according to Martin.

"The concern we have is that we know it's a single wall. We don't know if its leaked. That's the first thing before we even go forward with that building," he said.

He said the town must determine whether the tank has leaked into the soil and to remove it before any work is done on the West Street building.

"If we find out there is a leakage and there's contamination of the soils, we know that \$116,000 is not going to cover it. You're talking up to \$1 million and if surrounding wells aren't contaminated," Martin said.

If that is the case, the town would need to address remediation and requirements from the Department of Environmental Projection, Martin added.

The plan is to move to a propane mini split for the heating and cooling of the building, following the removal of the tank.

Finance Committee Chair John Libera Jr. said he supported the allocation.

"When you look at the long-term picture of it," he said. "The fact that there is \$5 million in other funds, including ARPA funds, if you took all that money and put it back into the stabilization fund...then you'd have a big pile of money in that fund. You'd still have the same question of 'what do we spend money on?"

He said having the municipal offices in one central location is a good use of the funds.

He added that if the town needs to address the oil tank and unforeseen issues with it, that the town will decide what to do from there rather than simply proceed forward with the West Street building project.

Selectboard member Glenn Sexton said he wanted to remind people if the ARPA funding given to the town was not used, they could potentially lose it.

"It's a benefit to us to move forward with the project. It's taxpayer money that the federal government gave us, and I'd hate for them to take it back," he said.

If the voters approve the expenditure, the committee plans to continue working on the project, with the oil tank being the first matter addressed. Barring any issues, the project has an estimated completion date of December 2024, according to the future of the West Street Building information sheet on the town's website.

If the voters do not approve the article, the town will continue to pay for general maintenance on the building until it is decommissioned. The estimated cost of decommissioning due to asbestos abatement and demolition would be about \$2.5 million.



# Granby library to host pastel workshop

GRANBY – The town's public library will soon host an upcoming Georgia O'Keeffe-inspired pastel workshop for adults and teens entitled "The Rose."

Award-winning pastel artist Gregory John Maichack will present the workshop from 11 a.m. – 1 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 16.





Each team also had two power plays in the first period, but the man-advantage units could not generate much offense, and the 0-0 deadlock remained into the intermission.

After the equalizer, both teams had more power play chances to take leads, but the penalty killing strengthened, along with continued good work from Zherenko and Blomqvist.

The game took on a truly chaotic feel in the third period. After the T-Birds failed to convert on two separate power play chances, it was the fourth line that got Springfield its first lead. 


